SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS, SPECIAL CHARGES AND OTHER SPECIAL TAXES, WIS. STATS. 74.11 (3) SHALL BE PAID IN FULL ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31, 2025

All real property taxes, special assessments, special charges and special taxes that become delinquent shall be paid, together with interest and penalties charged from the preceding February 1, to the county treasurer. Wis. Stats. 74.11 (11) (a).

If payment from a taxpayer is received which is not sufficient to pay all general property taxes, special taxes due, the treasurer shall apply the payment to the amounts due, including interest and penalties, in the following order pursuant to Wis. Stats. 74.11 (12):
1. Delinquent utility charges. 4. Special taxes.
2. Special charges. 5. Real property taxes.
3. Special assessments

LOTTERY CREDIT

For qualified homeowners on your principal residence only. The credit amount will appear preprinted on the tax bill of all taxpayers who have timely filed the precertification form. However, in order to receive the full credit the parcel of land must have a value of \$29,300. Qualified owners whose property tax bill does not reflect a credit will be able to claim the credit by use of a late claim form through January 31, 2025.

- ATTENTION - DOG OWNERS

The owner of a dog more than 5 months of age on January 1, of any year, or 5 months of age within the license year shall annually, or on or before the date the dog becomes 5 months of age pay the dog license tax and obtain a license. Wis. Stats. 174.05 (1).
The minimum dog license tax is \$3 for a neutered male dog or spayed female dog, upon presentation of evidence that the dog is neutered or spayed, and \$8 for an unneutered male dog or unspayed female dog.
No license will be issued without proof of rabies vaccination. Please bring or send copies of your veterinarian record showing vaccine brand name, serial number and expiration date.
Rabies vaccination required for all dogs within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. Wis. Stats. 95.21 (2).

KEEPING OF DANGEROUS ANIMALS PROHIBITED

It shall be unlawful to keep, harbor, own or any way possess within the corportate limits of the City of Neillsville:
(1) Any warm-blooded, carnivorous or omnivorous, wild or exotic animal including but not limited to non-human primates, raccoons, skunks, foxes and wild and exotic cats.
(2) Any animal having venomous/poisonous bites.
(3) Any animal that has previously been declared as a dangerous animal by another entity.
City code ordinance Section 7-1-5(a).

LIMITATION ON NUMBER OF DOGS
No person or family shall own, harbor, or keep in its possession more than a total of three (3) dogs in any residential unity (except those grandfathered on the effective date of the ordinance). City code ordinances Section 7-1-6(e)(1).

The Common Council met in regular session, Mayor Poeschel presiding. On roll call: all members present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The minutes of the previous meeting were declared approved.

Council Member Rochester reported on the November 13, 2024 meeting of the Heritage Days Committee regarding the Truck Show, activities and posters.

Council Member Neville reported on the November 19, 2024 meeting of the Library Board regarding: 1) Librarians’ reports, 2) WLA Conference report, 3) discussion on City Library budget and Clark County Board Library budget, 4) discussion on revised Director’s Evaluation Template, 5) payment of bills, 6) updates on donation and carryover funds and 7) community events.
