Receiving Water And Location: the Black River in
the Rock and Cawley Creeks watershed within the
Black River Drainage Basin located in Clark County
Brief Facility Description and Summary of Pro-
posed Changes: The Greenwood Wastewater Treat-
ment Facility treats domestic waste from the City of
Greenwood & the City of Loyal, and pretreated indus-
trial waste from Greenwood Milk Products and Dairy
Concepts. The annual average design flow of the fa-
cility is 0.524 million gallons per day (MGD). The ac-
tual annual average influent flow in 2023 was 0.315
MGD. The wastewater is treated via oxidation ditches
and final clarification. Phosphorus is removed using
chemical addition of ferric chloride. The wastewater is
disinfected seasonally (May-Sept) with ultraviolet light
prior to discharge to the Black River. Sludge is treated
via aerobic and anaerobic digestion and thickened with
a gravity belt thickener and land applied to DNR ap-
proved sites. The Department has reapproved water
quality trading (WQT) as the method of complying with
effluent phosphorus limits at Outfall 001. The Village
of Greenwood submitted an updated Water Quality
Trading Plan WQT-2024-0012 that provides details of
the trade. The plan provides calculations and a table
that shows the amount of phosphorus credits that will
be available each year. Even with phosphorus credits
available, there is still a phosphorus monthly average
concentration effluent limit of 1 mg/L that acts as the
minimum control level and applies to outfall 001. Sig-
nificant effluent monitoring or limit changes proposed
in the upcoming term are as follows: 1) an increase in
the monitoring frequency for BOD, TSS, phosphorus &
ammonia, 2) fecal coliform monitoring & limit replaced
with Escherichia coli (E. coli), 3) monitoring for PFOS
and PFOA added every other month in accordance
with s. NR 106.98(2)(c), Wis. Adm. Code along with
an associated compliance schedule, 4) the addition
of annual monitoring for total nitrogen, nitrite + nitrate
nitrogen and total Kjeldahl nitrogen, and 5) addition
of chronic WET testing. The following changes have
been made at both influent & effluent: 1) the flow moni-
toring frequency has been changed from continuous to
daily for DMR reporting purposes, and 2) the sample
type for various parameters has been changed from
24-hour flow proportional composite to 24 hour com-
posite. Additionally, to quantitate the risk, PFAS sludge
sampling has been included in the permit pursuant to
ss. NR 214.18(5)(b) and NR 204.06(2)(b)9., Wis. Adm.
Code.

The Department has tentatively decided that the
above-specified WPDES permit should be reissued.
Limitations and conditions which the Department
believes adequately protect the receiving water are
included in the proposed permit. Land application of
waste shall be done in accordance with permit condi-
tions and applicable codes. All land application sites
shall be approved prior to their use. To receive a list of
approved sites, or to be notified of potential approvals,
contact the above-named basin engineer.

Persons wishing to comment on or object to the
proposed permit action, or to request a public hear-
ing, may write to the Department of Natural Resources
at the above-named permit drafter's address. All com-
ments or suggestions received no later than 30 days
after the publication date of this public notice will be
considered along with other information on file in mak-
ing a final decision regarding the permit. Anyone pro-
viding comments in response to this public notice will
receive a notification of the Department's final deci-
sion when the permit is issued. Where designated as a
reviewable surface water discharge permit, the U.S.
Environmental Protection Agency is allowed up to 90
days to submit comments or objections regarding this
permit determination. If no comments are received on
the proposed permit from anyone, including U.S. EPA,
the permit will be issued as proposed.

The Department may schedule a public informa-
tional hearing if requested by any person and shall
schedule a public informational hearing if a petition re-
questing a hearing is received from 5 or more persons
or if response to this notice indicates significant public
interest pursuant to s. 283.49, Wis. Stats. Requests
for a public informational hearing shall state the follow-
ing: the name and address of the person(s) requesting
the hearing; the interest in the proposed permit of the
person(s) requesting the hearing; the reasons for the
request; and the issues proposed to be considered at
the hearing.

the draft permit, fact sheet and permit application, may
be inspected and copied at either the above-named
permit drafter's office or the above named basin en-
gineer's office, Monday through Friday (except holi-

days), between 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Please call the

COMMON COUNCIL, COUNCIL ROOM
NOVEMBER 12, 2024 7:00 P.M.

The Common Council met in regular session, Mayor Poeschel presiding. On roll call: all members present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The minutes of the previous meeting were declared approved.

Council Member Petkovsek reported on the October 22, 2024 meeting of the Grants Committee regarding: 1) reviewed and updating the list of grants in progress and 2) discussion on the City’s current Comprehensive Plan.

Council Member Clough reported on the November 12, 2024 meeting of the Commission on Public Works/Utilities regarding: 1) current activities, 2) a public hearing on the proposed sewer rate increase with no appearances, 3) approval of and recommendation of the proposed sewer rate increase of 9% effective for billings after March 1, 2025 and 4) rescheduling the regular Tuesday, December 24, 2024 meeting to Monday, December 23, 2024 at 6:45P.M.

Mayor Poeschel declared all reports filed as presented with the City Clerk.

Jerilyn St. Amand stated that with Associated Bank closing-what is being done about all these businesses closing and leaving.

Mayor Poeschel asked if there were any question on the Commission on Public Works/Utilities item (3).

SEWER RATE INCREASE

The sewer rate increase is being sought to provide an estimated increase of 9%, or \$56,434 per year in gross revenues. The proposed quarterly rates for sewage contributors discharging domestic strength sewage are:

General Sewer Service – Unmetered

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This rate shall be applied only to single-family residential customers and approximates the cost for 1,000 cubic feet per quarter discharged to the sewer system.

Definitions

Category A: Those sanitary sewer users who discharge normal domestic strength wastewater with concentrations of BOD no greater than 271 mg/L, suspended solids no greater than 265mg/L, or phosphorus no greater than 10 mg/L.

Category B: Those sanitary sewer users who discharge with concentration in excess of 271 mg/L of BOD, 265 mg/L of suspended solids, or 10 mg/L phosphorus.

Billing: Bills for sewer service are rendered quarterly and become due and payable on the first of the month following the period for which service is rendered. A late payment charge of 3% but not less than \$0.50 will be added to bills not paid within 20 days of issuance. This late payment charge is applicable to all customers.

City Clerk Roehl presented the 2025 dental insurance renewal from Joe Kottke, TriCor Insurance Agent for Delta Dental. The Employee Plan premium is going from \$41.58 to \$42.41 or \$0.83 (2%). The Employee and Spouse Plan premium is going from \$83.16 to \$84.82 or \$1.66 (2%). The Employee and Child Plan premium is going from \$84.78 to \$86.48 or \$1.70 (2%). The Family Plan premium is going from \$138.80 to \$141.58 or \$2.78 (2%). The monthly overall increase is 2%.

Motion Counsell, second Petkovsek, to approve the 2025 Dental Insurance contract renewal with Delta Dental as presented. All Aye.

Mayor Poeschel presented a request from the Neillsville Area Chamber of Commerce for changing the date from Friday, December 6, 2024 (as approved at the October 22, 2024 Council meeting) to Saturday, December 7, 2024 for use of the Sniteman Town Square Park and Gazebo for the official “Tree Lighting/Santa’s Coming to Town” event.

Motion Neville, second Rochester, to approve the date change as presented. All Aye.

City Clerk Roehl reported on receiving the following donations from the Marguerite Listeman Foundation - \$6,000 for Defibrillators and \$4,000 for Police Radios.

Motion Clough, second Rochester, to accept and appropriate \$6,000 to Account No. 57140 Public Buildings and \$4,000 to Account No. 52100 Police Department Administration and to thank the Listeman Foundation for the donations. All Aye.

Fire Chief Matt Meyer reported on receiving five bids on the 1980 IHC Pumper/Tanker fire truck. The high bid of \$7,000 was received from Kenneth Lovstad, Neillsville.

Motion Neville, second Rochester, to accept the high bid of \$7,000 from Kenneth Lovstad, Neillsville for the 1980 IHC Pumper/Tanker fire truck. All Aye.

7:12 P.M. – Mayor Poeschel declared the Public Hearing on the Zoning Amendment, 118 Clay Street, Parcel Nos. 261.0047.000 and 261.0045.000, Next Generation Properties, LLC, Nick Brunner, owner and applicant now open.

Director of Public Works Friemoth presented the application, public notice of this public hearing was in the Clark County Press and area land owners were notified.

Director of Public Works Friemoth stated that the Planning Commission at it’s September 30, 2024 meeting discussed and recommended approval of the Zoning Amendment.

Mayor Poeschel called for appearances.

David Carlson, Next Generation Properties Partner, stated they are looking at a maximum of five units, they work with youth homelessness, which is typically a family with a child, they are actual tenants.

Council Member Counsell asked if this is Federal and/or State subsidized.

Carlson replied “no”, the rents are reduced and tenants may be getting support.

Dan Herbrand, 111 Clay Street, stated we want to help people, is there a limit on the number of people housed, is this a month-to-month deal with the long-term strategy to find employment.

Mayor Poeschel stated it will be five units.

Carlson stated he used to provide direct services to these individuals and they are from the Neillsville area, we are trying to meet the issues they have here.

Herbrand stated that this is a historical house, will someone be monitoring the structure so it does not go into disrepair, we also have concerns about property values.

Karen Gilbert, 110 Clay Street, stated her concerns are the same as Herbrand’s. Young people will have a chance, the concern is if you have five families, how many people are a family, 1, 2 or more.

Carlson stated they are looking at fifteen people max (five units of three member families).

Mayor Poeschel called three times for appearances.

7:21 P.M. – Mayor Poeschel declared the Zoning Amendment Public Hearing closed.

Mayor Poeschel asked if the Council Members had any further discussion or questions.

Council Member Clough stated that the property is on the Historic Register and any changes to the façade requires Historic Preservation Commission approval for the outside of the building and a Certificate of Appropriateness.

Carlson asked if they should be applying.

Council Member Clough stated “yes” if you are going to make outside changes, it does not apply to interior changes.

Mayor Poeschel asked if they have other properties of this nature.

Carlson replied this is the tenth property now.

Chief of Police Mankowski stated that he has known Carlson for about three years, he has a good team under him, he has no concerns, they are very good landlords, working with the homeless/unsheltered people, he has credibility and a good working relationship with the school.

Council Member Counsell asked what they intended to do with the extra building.

Carlson stated it would not be a housing structure.

Council Member Petkovsek stated there has been disappointment regarding the upkeep of the lawn and outside of the building – will they be maintained.

Motion Clough, second Rochester, to accept the Planning Commission recommendation to approve the Zoning Amendment for Parcel Nos. 261.0047.000 and 261.0045.000, 118 Clay Street, Next Generation Properties, LLC, Nick Brunner, owner and applicant, to change the zoning from R-1 Single Family Residential to R-3 Multi-Family Residential. All Aye.

7:26 P.M – Mayor Poeschel declared the Public Hearing on the Proposed 2025 Budget for the City now open.

The City Clerk reported that the proposed 2025 General Fund Budget of \$3,852,961 is lower than the Consumer Price Index (3.2%) and lower than the Wisconsin Department of Revenue Expenditure Restraint Program (4.8%) guidelines. The proposed 2024 tax levy of \$1,348,124 without TID’s exceeds the Statue’s levy limit requirement of 0% plus net new construction (2.624% or \$28,499) plus terminated TID #2 (1.962% or \$21,310); however, the Finance Committee has recommended approving a levy limit adjustment increase: Section D, Line E (\$257,578) for Debt Service Levy for general obligation debt authorized after July 1, 2005 – this would bring the City into compliance with the allowable levy limit for the City.

Mayor Poeschel called three times for appearances – there being none.

7:31 P.M. – Mayor Poeschel declared the budget hearing closed.

Motion Neville, second Rochester, to approve the Levy limit Section D, Line E adjustment for Debt Service Levy for general obligation debt authorized after July 1, 2005 (\$257,578). All Aye.

Motion Clough, second Neville, to adopt the 2025 City Budget of \$3,852,961 with \$1,421,539 to be placed on the 2024 Tax Roll. On roll call: All Aye.

Chief Mankowski reported on training, purchasing a taser, squad car maintenance, October parking enforcement, citations, warnings, incidents, office activity, officer activity, business patrols and Town of Mentor contract policing.

City Clerk Roehl reported on receiving notice that the Associated Bank-Neillsville branch will be closing January 31, 2025 – the City will be working on realigning their accounts; ribbon cuttings will be held at Sunset Place Apartment Senior Supportive Housing on November 19, 2024 and Sassy’s Suites Consignment on November 20, 2024.

City Clerk Roehl reported that Jack Miller called wanting to know why the City does not get any revenue for the Wisconsin Air National Guard parking vehicles and trailers at the airport.
